





Information on throwing away equipment during the coronavirus situation

Easy Read Document



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	<p>People can catch the coronavirus illness from each other.</p>
	<p>Our social care staff will wear special equipment when they visit you.</p> <p>This is to help stop coronavirus spreading and to keep you and your social care worker safe.</p>
	<p>This letter tells you what needs to happen with the equipment after it has been used in your home.</p> <p>Our social care staff will follow the Public Health England (PHE) rules about cleaning and throwing away the equipment used in your home.</p>
	<p>What happens when you do not have coronavirus symptoms such as a fever, cough or difficulty breathing</p>
	<p>The social care worker will put the equipment in a plastic waste bag and throw away in your usual rubbish bin.</p> <p>You do not need to do anything.</p>

	<p>What happens when you have coronavirus symptoms such as a fever, cough or difficulty breathing</p>
	<p>The social care worker will do three things after they take off the equipment.</p>
	<p>1. They will put the equipment in a plastic waste bag and tie it up</p>
	<p>2. They will put the plastic waste bag inside another one and tie it up.</p>
 	<p>3. They will put the bags in a safe place, away from your usual rubbish and leave it there for 3 days.</p> <p>This is because the risk of catching the coronavirus illness from the equipment after 3 days is much less.</p>

After you have waited for three days you can then put the bags in your normal rubbish.

There will be a label on the bags telling you the date you can put the bags in your normal rubbish.
